Philippian Philosophizing:

- On Paul's second journey, at Troas, he had a vision calling him to Macedonia (Acts 16:6-10), and a 2-day boat ride brought him to Neapolis (Acts 16:11), 10 miles from Philippi, through a mountain pass. Later, the return trip would take 5 days (Acts 20:6). Located in Thrace by the name of *Crenides* ("little fountain"), it was captured in 50 B.C. by, and named for, the Greek, Philip of Macedon, father of Alexander the Great. Romans conquered it in 168 B.C., and in 42 B.C. the army of Octavius and Anthony defeated the army of Brutus and Cassius. Octavius, as Augustus Caesar, strengthened the city as a Roman colony (Acts 16:12). Since the place of prayer was a riverside, and not a synagogue (Acts 16:13), there probably were not many Jews living there. Lydia and her household became the first European converts to the Gospel (Acts 16:14-15). Paul cast out a slave girl's spirit of divination which led to his and Silas' imprisonment. Freed by an earthquake, they baptized the jailor and his household (Acts 16:16-34). Paul demanded public release by the magistrates since they had publicly beaten him, a Roman citizen, a thing Rome forbade (Acts 16:22-23, 35-40).
- The church at Philippi is the only one in the New Testament which had elders and deacons mentioned (Philippians 1:1).
- Paul probably wrote this letter from Roman incarceration Philippians 1:7
